Annual Report 2022





For the grade 9 de-streamed science curriculum, in partnership with SELO (Science Education Leaders of Ontario), the Leading De-Streamed Grade 9 Science Networking Event was held at the end of August. For this event, we had 99 registrants which represented approximately 37 school boards in Ontario! We hope this is just the beginning of an era of collaborative work and we look forward to continuing to collaborate with previous partners and forging new partnerships with other organisations, as well as our membership, to support excellence in Science and STEM education.

We have been and continue to be an organisation that is driven by our volunteers and members. During the last 2 years, we have all had time to think and learn a thing or two, so if you have some ideas or suggestions that can help bring STAO/APSO back stronger, please connect with us.

- Curriculum resources prepared through the Ministry of Education Grant;

- Efforts focused on membership growth through a new value proposition and renewed connectedness to the Ontario Faculties of Education;

Internal Focus:

- Communications and branding have come back in-house to ensure consistency and frequency of messaging;
- A visioning exercise was initiated to prepare STAO/APSO to move forward with a refreshed focus, strengthened mission, and values that reflect what our Association represents to the science education community;
- Revised policies and procedures written to enhance financial accountability and reporting approved by our Auditor;
- Financial processes have been streamlined resulting in significant financial savings;
- Hiring of a Part-Time French Language Program Manager; and
- Contract review has resulted in further reduction in expenditures.

STAO is a volunteer-driven organization. Nothing can happen without our volunteers. And the pandemic was very hard on our volunteers and members. So, I want to acknowledge our members that continue to encourage excellence in science learning and advance science education in Ontario, during such challenging times. 
